## Safety initiatives introduced at UWA



Since the 2016 national safety survey, students and staff have worked together to introduce a wide range of initiatives and programs to help ensure UWA is a safe and inclusive place for all those who visit. These include:

- The formation of the <u>UWA Safer Communities Working Group</u> a partnership between the University and UWA Student Guild.
- The launch of the UWA Safer Communities Award to recognise staff and students who help create a safe, inclusive and supportive environment.
- Our convention of the WA RNA Network so Western Australian universities can work together to support all students in response to sexual assault and harassment.
- The launch of our <u>Step Up Bystander Intervention Training</u>, with more than 1,500 students and staff trained so far to safely intervene if they see someone in trouble.
- The commission of an independent audit and review of sexual misconduct within the college setting. The majority of recommendations made in the review have since been <u>endorsed and implemented</u> by all UWA-affiliated colleges and this work is ongoing.
- The provision of an extensive program of events by the <u>UWA Student Guild</u>
  <u>Women's Department</u> each year, such as healthy relationship education, selfdefence workshops and the award-winning #EndTheViolence week.
- The launch of <u>The Living Room</u> which provides a welcoming space where someone is always available if students are feeling stressed, upset or just need a chat. No appointment required.
- The implementation of the Ask for Angela initiative at the UWA Tavern.
- The launch of an online system for reporting incidents to make the process easier.
- The launch of a confidential disclosure service to support students in response to incidents of sexual harm with academic adjustments, fast-tracked referrals and advice on reporting options.
- The improvement of information available on how to seek support and report an incident.
- Making external toilets across campus accessible only with a student or staff card after-hours.
- The launch of a security SMS line, so our community can contact UWA Security if they're in a situation where verbal communication is not possible.
- The launch of the SafeZone app with quick tap buttons that connect students, staff and visitors to UWA Security for any safety or security issues on campus.
- Improving lighting across campus to provide lower glare and better visibility after dark.
- The launch of low-barrier consent and healthy relationships outreach activities run by trained Health Promotion Peer Educators on campus and at UWA's residential colleges.
- Strengthening the partnership between the Guild and University health and wellbeing services to streamline and speed up the process of support.

- Increasing the number of Guild club executives that receive training from the Sexual Assault Resource Centre (SARC).
- Wellbeing Volunteers are now present at all Guild events where alcohol is available.
- UWA and Curtin University have partnered together to introduce an online Respectful Relationships Module with students (expected release April/May 2022).
- Introduction of two online modules for staff which provide information on sexual assault and harassment, and how to respond to a disclosure.
- Updated standalone Sexual Misconduct Policy and Procedures published on the UWA Policy website, including clearer processes for disclosure and reporting.

## This is in addition to ongoing safety and support services and initiatives that were already in place before the recommendations from the 2016 survey:

- 24/7 security services and our after-hours security escort service where a security officer will walk staff and students to their car, bus stop or accommodation adjacent to the University after dark.
- Mental Health First Aid Training provided free to all students and staff.
- Counselling and support available from UWA Counselling and Psychological Services, Guild Student Assist, Employee Assistance Program and the UWA Medical Centre.
- Incident reporting and remediation.
- Our <u>Ally program</u> which creates advocates for our LGBTIQA+ community.
- Reducing the Risk of Sexual Trauma training provided by SARC for Guild student leaders and Residential Advisers (RAs).
- Providing staff with training and professional development opportunities on responding to disclosures of sexual violence and supporting students in response to sexual harm.
