

English language pathways to UWA degrees

UWA CELT offers two options to improve English language proficiency to the level required by the University for entry into its undergraduate and postgraduate programs.

OPTION 1: Academic English and Study Skills Bridging Course

(CRICOS course code: 026607K)

DIALECT)

The most common and recommended pathway is via UWA CELT's Academic English and Study Skills Bridging Course (Bridging Course).'

The Bridging Course has been granted NEAS Premium Product Endorsement. There are three intakes per year which align with the UWA semester 1 and 2 start dates. Each intake has Module 1 (10 weeks) and Module 2 (10 weeks) with different English language entry requirements for each Module. In addition, Module 1 is developed to further support language improvement and skill development. Module 2 is designed to further hone language skills via research and critical analysis using their discipline area.

The Bridging Course has been designed for international students who wish to study at UWA but do not have the required level of English language proficiency.

The Bridging Course program is also suitable for students with unconditional entry into UWA who would like to further develop their confidence, language ability and to better cope with the demands of the academic environment before starting tertiary studies.

A 70 per cent pass in the Bridging Course meets the University's English language requirement for most undergraduate and postgraduate courses that require an IELTS of 6.5 with no band below 6.0. However, some courses at UWA have higher entry requirements. The Bridging Course will help students to:

- Improve English language skills to the level required by UWA
- Learn about the organisation and language of various types of academic texts
- Develop knowledge of the language of their chosen discipline
- Develop an understanding of the Australian academic and research culture
- Develop a high level of analytical and reflective skills in an Australian academic context
- Work on a research paper and portfolio in their discipline area and on research presentations
- Develop strategies to attribute literary sources appropriately
- Develop the capacity to be autonomous learners at an Australian university with the confidence to participate freely and appropriately in academic situations

Students unable to meet the Bridging Course entry requirements have the option of improving their English competency by starting with an English for Academic Purposes, or Language and Communication Essentials course at UWA CELT before the start of the Bridging Course.

OPTION 2: English for Academic Purposes (EAP) + IELTS/TOEFL examination

An alternative pathway for university entrance is available through our English for Academic Purposes program, together with preparation for the IELTS or TOEFL examination.

English for Academic Purposes is a structured course offered in five-week modules but is modified every term to meet the needs of the class group.

The 20-hour per week course is tailored to the knowledge and ability of its students, offering a highly supportive means to develop academic skills and English language ability. This focus on student needs incorporates assessment of achievements according to the composition of each class. For this reason, students choosing to study English for Academic Purposes must also sit an IELTS or internet-based TOEFL examination.

UWA CELT offers accredited English language programs in Language and Communication Essentials, English for Academic Purposes as well as preparation for internationally recognised examinations such as IELTS. Choosing the best course for you will depend on your goals and level of language ability. UWA CELT offers different courses from beginner to advanced levels to help develop your language proficiency.

Note: Language and Communication Essentials students are placed into classes based on verified scores obtained in IELTS, TOEFL or PTE exams. Other exams or qualifications may be provided to determine Recognition of Prior Learning, such as WACE qualifications or prior learning at another English Australia member language centre. Should no proof of English be available, students will be given a Placement Test to complete that equates to the Common European Framework of Reference Levels.

English for Academic Purposes

Length of course: From 5 to 15 weeks

English for Academic Purposes classes are for learners who want to develop their English language ability in preparation for tertiary studies in an English-speaking country. In five-week teaching modules, learners develop listening and note-taking skills, seminar and presentation skills together with academic reading and writing skills.

They also learn to adapt to the academic culture of Australian tertiary institutions.

Note: EAP does not provide direct entry to a UWA degree course; EAP students must either sit an IELTS or internet-based TOEFL examination to gain entry. EAP can provide a direct pathway to UWA Exchange & Study Abroad programs without further external testing.

UWA CELT delivers preparation courses for the internationally recognised International English Language Testing System (IELTS) examination. There are six terms per year for the intensive 20- hour per week course.

The course examines each section of the IELTS test, providing you with the skills necessary to improve your IELTS score.



UWA CELT runs dual timetables for our English programs, including:

- Language and Communication Essentials
- English for Academic Purposes
- IELTS Examination Preparation

Students will either study a morning program from 8.30am to 12.45pm, or an afternoon program from 1pm-5.15pm.

Confirmation of the program times will be provided to students at time of enrolment.

Students do not need to identify which timetable they would like to enrol. The Centre will place students in the most appropriate timetable based on their level of English and general demand.

Our English language programs focus on the highest quality teaching and learning with a high degree of action and interaction.



If a student group wants to get a taste of UWA and UWA CELT, a short-term study tour that combines any or all of the following – academic study, Australian culture and English language – could be just the answer.

UWA CELT organises three broad categories of courses for groups of participants.

Open programs

This course gives participants with different levels of English ability the opportunity to take part in the UWA Centre for English Language Teaching courses such as Language and Communication Essentials, Academic English and examination preparation with other international students.

Closed programs

These individually tailored courses are designed for the needs of each particular group. In this kind of course, participants tend to stay together in the one class, and it is preferable that students are of similar language ability. These individually tailored programs are for groups of participants from high schools, university faculties, corporations, government and cultural bodies. The programs vary in duration from four days to 12 weeks and generally fall into one of four types: UWA **Experience** (with a focus on discipline areas such as engineering, physics, biochemistry, law, agriculture, business and medicine), Australian Culture, English for Specific Purposes and **TESOL** Professional Development.

These individually tailored programs can be offered throughout the academic year and delivered across varying levels of English proficiency.


Hybrid programs

This is a combination of both the open and closed class options. The morning gives participants the opportunity to take part in UWA CELT's open class Language and Communication Essentials and Academic English courses. The afternoon gives participants the opportunity to study with a focus on a particular discipline area, or the chance to include any number of cultural activities to enrich their experience.





1. Decide which course you would like to apply for

Consult this brochure and the UWA CELT website **celt.uwa.edu.au/courses** to choose a program that best suits your goals.

2. Complete the application form

If you are enrolling for our Language and Communication Essentials (LCE), English for Academic Purposes (EAP) or IELTS Examination Preparation courses visit our website at celt.uwa. edu.au/courses/apply to complete your application, and to see the full list of documents required for your application. Complete all sections including your personal details, study plan and visa information. Please read the terms and conditions of enrolment.

Alternatively, submit your application through a UWA CELT overseas representative in your home country. A complete list of representatives can bed found at celt.uwa.edu.au/courses/apply

If you are applying for the Bridging Course as part of your pathway in a UWA degree, your application must be submitted via UWA Apply either directly or via an authorised agent, please visit uwa.edu.au/study/international-students

3. Online Placement Test

If you have enrolled in Language and Communication Essentials, English for Academic Purposes or an IELTS course and you do not have valid results, an online placement test will be sent to you.

The test must be completed in the given time and should be completed without any assistance. The results will help identify your current English level and ensure you are in the correct class.

4. Offer letter

UWA CELT will process your application and will send you a letter of offer and acceptance documents, unless you have applied for the Bridging Course, your letter of offer will come via UWA Admissions.

The offer letter will include an invoice for your course, and other applicable fees such as Overseas Student Health Cover if you are applying for a student visa.

To accept your offer, you must sign the offer and return it to **enrolments-celt@uwa.edu.au** and pay all the fees as outlined in the offer.



5. Apply for your visa to match your course and study duration

To study as an international student in Australia, you will need to ensure you have the correct visa type depending on how long you want to study. Each visa type comes with different conditions and things you can do, and not do while on the visa.

You can study full-time or part-time for up to 12 weeks if you have a visitor visa, or 17 weeks on a working holiday visa. If you want to study for longer, you must study full time on a student visa.

All visa application processes are handled by the Australia Governments, Department of Home Affairs

Am I a domestic or international student?

You are an **international student** if you are:

- a temporary resident (visa status) of Australia,
- a permanent resident (visa status) of New Zealand, or
- a resident or citizen of any other country.

You are an **Australian domestic student** if you are:

- an Australian citizen,
- an Australian permanent resident (holders of all categories of permanent residency visas, including humanitarian visas), or
- a New Zealand citizen.
