The Gallery

Lawrence Wilson Art Gallery (LWAG) is one of Western Australia's premier public art institutions. Located within the University of Western Australia grounds, the gallery presents an accessible series of public and academic programs and innovative and diverse exhibitions featuring contemporary and historic art from WA and the world.

The University's extensive collections include the UWA Art Collection, comprising over 3,000 artworks and notable for its holdings of mid-twentieth century and contemporary Australian art; The Berndt Museum, which cares for globally significant collections, particularly of Australian Indigenous art and cultural material; and the Cruthers Collection of Women's Art, Australia's largest public collection of women's art.

The gallery is free and accessible to all and open Tuesday to Saturday 12-5pm


In co-curating this exhibition, Amanda Bell, Badimia and Yued artist and curator, and Lee Kinsella, CCWA curator, offer visitors a journey through the Gallery space, guided by sound and light. Drawing upon objects from several UWA collections, and enriched by new commissions from Amanda Bell, Corey Khan and Rickeeta Walley, *KANANGOOR/Shimmer* is a consideration of our relationship with our environment. You are invited to follow the wardong in flight as we travel across Country and recognise reverberations of comfort and of disquiet.

KANANGOOR / Shimmer considers responses to the landscape – of objects that emerge from a profound engagement with land, to others that communicate a sense of dislocation or strangeness. The exhibition includes works of protest and works of power, beauty and delicacy, such as the shimmering silk batik fabrics produced by women artists from Utopia in the late 90's, and Joseph Williams Jungarrayi's remarkable paintings overlaid upon maps from an abandoned gold mine. What is consistent to all is a sense of agency – of the land being active and vital.

Also featuring music scores by composer Meta Overman and newly commissioned work by Amanda Bell, Corey Khan and Rickeeta Walley.

The installation *Wirringkirri* in the Janet Holmes à Court gallery is curated by the Berndt Museum.

Thought to have been lost to her, this painting marks a major shift in her work and is the precursor to her iconic *Homemaker* series.

Charmaine Councillor, the CEO of a local Noongar Language hub in Bunbury; Wardandi Miya-k Kaadadjiny Aboriginal Corporation, established in 2020, has been leading language and song writing workshops for Community Art Network's project *Lullabies*, teaching Noongar language through the creation of songs for children.

An author and artist of five children's books in both Noongar and English, Charmaine was a consultant and writer for the children's NITV program *Waabiny Time*. She is also a talented musician and is the singer and guitarist of her band WARANGKA.

Charmaine is studying for a Bachelor of Arts in Indigenous Languages and Linguistics, and her aspirations are to encourage her community to embrace and continue to revive and maintain Noongar Language for future generations.

Join internationally renowned and award-winning clarinet soloist and bass clarinettist Dr Ashley Smith at LWAG as he discusses Meta Overman's contribution to contemporary music in Australia.

Surviving two world wars in Holland, Overman migrated to Australia in 1951, living first in WA. She composed for piano solo, orchestra, operas, ballets and chamber works, and considered her most important piece to be *Psyche*, a three-act opera that was performed in the Sunken Garden at UWA as part of the 1955 Festival of Perth.


Education
