Welcome to the Australian Studies Research Network Bulletin August 2025

Dr. Naomi Preston recently completed her PhD in History at the University of Western Australia, examining heritage interpretation of difficult histories of incarceration, forced labour and punishment. Her research focused on two significant Western Australian sites - Fremantle Prison and Wadjemup/Rottnest Island - investigating the barriers and limitations to effective interpretation of traumatic colonial histories.

Currently, Naomi works as a Historical Research Consultant with the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage on a project examining Aboriginal heritage sites across Western Australia related to Sites of Truth Telling, including massacre sites, missions, and prisons. She also serves as Research Officer with the Australian Legacies of Slavery project and Australian Studies Network at UWA.


Naomi has chapters forthcoming in two UCL Press collections: *Post/colonial Heritages:* Creative Approaches to Understanding and Addressing Colonized Pasts and Everyday Heritage: The Practice of Enchanting the Ordinary. She serves as Postgraduate Representative on the History Council of Western Australia and as a committee member of the Oral History Association of Western Australia. Her research contributes to ongoing conversations about decolonising heritage interpretation and developing more ethical approaches to presenting difficult colonial histories in museum and heritage contexts.

Professor Lake will chart Australia's growing cultural and political engagement with China from the 1960s with the decline of the White Australia Policy. While we know much about political exchanges, the strengthening of cultural ties during this period has not yet received appropriate historical scrutiny.
