Congratulations to Caroline Ingram and Andreas Zanker on the launch of their new books. Caroline's <u>Women on Trial (Springer, 2025)</u> offers a groundbreaking examination of how legal rules and institutions affected women's trials in nineteenth-century Western Australia, exploring the complex intersections of gender, class, Aboriginality, and legal literacy within the colonial justice system. Meanwhile, Andreas's <u>José Rizal, the Philippines, and Greco-Roman Antiquity (Routledge, 2026)</u> presents the first extended investigation of classical reception in the work of the Philippine national hero, revealing how Greco-Roman antiquity was creatively deployed in late-colonial struggles to redefine the relationship between Spain and the Philippines.

Now Open: Exhibition of the work of Julie Dowling

Gallows Gallery, Mosman Park

Julie Dowling was born in Subiaco, Western Australia and grew up in both semi-rural and urban areas in a large Badimaya extended family. Working in a social realist style, Dowling draws on diverse art traditions including European portraiture and Christian icons, mural painting and Badimaya First Nation iconography.

Dowling works like an ethnographer, recording the deep-seated injustices in the Indigenous community. Her pictorial works have a strong political edge, however, she speaks as a de-colonized subject and subverts the traditional power relations between the observer and the observed, the coloniser and the decolonised.

Facilitated by Global Encounters and First Nations Peoples: 1000 Years of Australian History (Monash University, ARC Laureate) and Mobilising Dutch East India Company Collection for New Global Stories (UWA, ARC Linkage) with the Western Australian Museum, this symposium brings together multidisciplinary research and cross-cultural perspectives to explore the deep and diverse histories of encounter across Australasia. It challenges dominant colonial narratives by privileging Indigenous and Asian knowledge systems and adopting a longer temporal lens.

Heatwaves are forgotten killers as deaths occur silently, in homes and institutions. In urban and temperate areas heatwaves evaporate from our memory, erased by the drama of fire, flood and storm. Environmental historians recognise the importance of climate as not simply a "backdrop against which history is played out" but an active force in Australian life. Through hospital records, diaries and press reports, we examine daily life in the mid-twentieth century as heatwaves unfold, finding that decisions about sleep, food, housing, clothing and social interaction, as well as professional and domestic labour, were disrupted and negotiated. By uncovering the everyday practices by which people negotiate weather, in urban, regional and remote areas, we reveal how heatwaves have been crucial in shaping the Australian idea and experience of climate.

Speakers include Mandy Paul, Rochelle Schoff, and Rebecca Jones.

Indigenous Land and Justice Research Group Scholarship University of New South Wales

The purpose of this \$15,000 scholarship is to support an Indigenous student to conduct Honours research that contributes to the theory and practice of Aboriginal self-determination policy.
