# **EXAM ESSAYS**

Writing an essay in an exam can be daunting, but the following tips will help you feel prepared and get the best results.

Exam essays test your ability to:

- · answer the questions appropriately;
- · develop an argument;
- use evidence to support your claims;
- · articulate your critical voice; and
- write clearly and correctly.

They provide the chance to show what you know about a number of topics.

#### TIP

It is **compulsory** to bring your **campus card** to all examinations.

If you do not have your card, you will not be permitted to sit your exam.

# For good results, planning is essential

Before the exam, find out:

- how long the exam will be; and
- how many questions you will have to answer.

Then you can determine how much time you should spend on each question.

#### TIP

Work out at what time you should finish each section, and stick to this timing in the exam.

# **Effective revision**

- Organise your notes so that you have information and examples which could be used to answer related questions.
- Prepare at least one "extra" topic in case you can't answer your "favourite" question, or it hasn't been included in the exam.
- Practice writing succinct, clear answers.

#### TIP

Practice writing essays under exam-like conditions. Use past exams if they are available and still relevant.

# Writing practice essays under examlike conditions will:

- Show you how much you can write in a specific time frame;
- Work as a form of overlearning and so help move information into your long term memory; and
- Boost your confidence that you can write what you need to in the given time.



# **During the exam**

- Choose the essay question(s) you intend to answer.
- 2. Analyse each question and identify what your main focus will be.
- 3. Decide on your thesis statement, i.e. the position you are going to argue for.
- 4. Jot down the points you will use to develop your argument.
- 5. Prioritise these dot points. They will be the focus of your paragraphs.

#### TIP


Write neatly so your examiner can readily understand your ideas.

- 6. Write your essay following the conventions of a good essay:
  - Start with an introduction that includes your thesis statement and a roadmap; and
  - Begin each paragraph with a topic sentence, develop one main idea in each paragraph, and then tie ideas together in the conclusion.
- 7. Do a quick spelling and grammar check if you have time at the end.

#### TIP

Use dot points in exam essays **only** if you have run out of time (which you won't if you follow your exam plan and the tips in this handout).
