

UWA Perth campus

UWA brings together heritage architecture and state-of-theart teaching and research facilities to provide an ideal learning environment. As a student, you can enjoy a range of recreational amenities and modern facilities, including lecture theatres, tutorial spaces, laboratories and more, to ensure you feel inspired to pursue your personal interests and career goals while studying.

Callaway Music Auditorium

The Callaway Music Auditorium is a purpose-built performance space with wonderful acoustics.

The auditorium has raked seating that can be retracted in several iterations allowing for bespoke performance set-ups. It can also be fully retracted to accommodate full orchestral rehearsals. Built with professional stage lighting, hydraulic baffles (allowing for different acoustic treatments), two concert grand pianos (a Fazioli and a Steinway) the Callaway auditorium offers a crisp sound for the audience.

Cullity Gallery

UWA's home of art and design, the Cullity Gallery is a unique venue showcasing innovative works in the arts, architecture and landscape architecture.

Open to the public five days a week, the gallery hosts three dedicated student exhibitions a year, as well as a number of private displays. The clean, modern space can be adjusted to house artworks of all sizes, while its removable walls allow the creation of different exhibition experiences and atmospheres.

All School of Design students have the opportunity to exhibit at the Cullity Gallery. These experiences help prepare UWA students for a career in art and design, and for the rigours of engaging directly with the public, collectors and industry professionals.

Eileen Joyce Studio

The Eileen Joyce Studio houses the UWA Conservatorium of Music's early keyboard collection, a range of instruments spanning the history of keyboard music and including clavichords, pipe and reed organs, a celeste and a variety of harpsichords and pianofortes. These instruments are part of an extensive collection of historic and ethnic musical instruments owned by the Conservatorium of Music.

The window-lined studio is used for teaching and performances, and offers views of the Somerville Auditorium.

New Fortune Theatre


The New Fortune Theatre is a uniquely faithful reconstruction of London's Fortune Playhouse, which was built in 1600 as a rival to Shakespeare's Globe Theatre.

Located in the heart of UWA's Arts building, the space has been a prime research and teaching tool for the School of Humanities since it opened with a production of *Hamlet* in 1964, the year of Shakespeare's 400th birthday.

As the only permanent reconstruction of the Fortune Playhouse in the world, the New Fortune Theatre is the only place in Australia – and one of only a few places worldwide - where you can experience Elizabethan plays as they were intended to be performed.

Thespians aren't the only performers to tread the boards of the New Fortune Theatre – it's also home to UWA's famous peacocks and peahens. Come along on a quiet afternoon and you'll see them perching around the balustrades or calling from the stage.

EDFAA Library

The Education, Fine Arts and Architecture (EDFAA) Library is an architecturally-designed, purposebuilt library with extensive facilities, providing a hub for students in the School of Design. Extensively refurbished, the EDFAA Library houses the Fine Arts and Architecture Collections, and includes informal study spaces, group work areas and bookable spaces.




















Student Guild


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A world-leading course model

The UWA course model is progressive, personalised and benchmarked against the world's leading universities.

You can choose from five bachelor's degrees: Arts, Biomedical Science, Commerce, Science and Philosophy - and you won't be limited to one major. Our course model means you can major in two areas. Choosing to complete two majors during your three-year bachelor's degree means you'll broaden your knowledge across multiple disciplines.

You also don't need to confirm your major, or majors, until the end of first year, so you can explore your strengths and interests, without losing time or money. Once you've graduated from your first degree, you can go straight into the workforce or continue on to postgraduate study.

A postgraduate degree gives you advanced knowledge and specialised skills, so you can take your career to the next level and become more attractive to employers. When you complete a postgraduate qualification at UWA, you'll enter your career with a higher qualification than a double degree. Studying up to two majors in your bachelor's degree – and raising your expertise to postgraduate level – gives you the qualifications and skills to succeed anywhere in the world.

Glossary

There are four types of units that make up your degree: core, broadening, complementary and elective. A unit is a subject that you study for one semester.

Broadening units

Broadening units add a valuable dimension to your studies and provide you with knowledge beyond the fields in which you choose to specialise. Undertaking broadening units is a requirement of the University's undergraduate degree course structure.

Complementary units

These units go hand-in-hand with your major/s and are designed to give you extra knowledge to help you complete your major.

Core units

A core unit is one that must be taken to complete your chosen major. Some majors have set core units while others allow you to choose from a list of core unit options.

Elective units

Also known as 'free choice' units, these units give you a great opportunity to explore other areas of interest and expand your knowledge.



In the spotlight

Performance is at the heart of the UWA Conservatorium of Music. With more than 200 events per year, students can expect to regularly take to the stage with a range of repertoire, and benefit from seeing amazing students, staff and industry professionals in action.

Sharing the arts

UWA alumnus lain Grandage has been appointed the Artistic Director of the Perth Festival from 2020. The Perth Festival started at UWA over 65 years ago, and includes many events that enliven the campus over summer, including outdoor movie screenings, Writers Week, and music, theatre and dance performances.

Art award

School of Design student Elham Eshraghian received the 2018 Schenberg Art Fellowship worth \$35,000. Elham specialises in film and video installations exploring the concept of cultural identity and loss.

Broaden your degree through music

The Conservatorium of Music offers a range of broadening units, so no matter what degree or major you choose at UWA, you can enrich your degree with music units (whether or not you have any music experience).

Explore music through units like Popular Music in Global Perspective, Women in Music or Music in World Cultures, or perform in a group through our Music Ensemble units. Ensemble options range from choirs and percussion ensembles suitable for absolute beginners through to advanced orchestras and other ensembles for experienced musicians.

Explore the world through art

A Fine Arts major will help you establish your career in the field of contemporary art and culture. UWA Fine Arts graduates are employed in influential positions in a range of professions such as artists, curators, designers, academics, writers, editors and publicists. Our graduates work within areas of gallery management, arts administration, corporate public relations, the public service, and policy development.

The major is an intensive studio-based course that allows you to work closely with nationally and internationally recognised practicing artists, along with experts from related creative arenas. At the School of Design, you will explore a range of artistic processes techniques and technologies that will prepare you for a successful career.

Women of Note: A Century of Australian Composers

Recent Conservatorium of Music graduate Olivia Davies had her composition *Crystalline* included on the ABC's two-disc compilation of works by Australian women composers released in March 2019. At just over 30, she is the youngest of the dozen fine composers featured.

National nomination honour

Alumna Deborah Skelton was nominated for the ARIA Music Teacher of the Year award in 2018, becoming the first West Australian to receive such recognition.

Moving to his own beat

Percussion graduate Adam Tan created Marimbafest, a four-day event on campus, to connect young percussionists with prominent performers from around the world.

He also runs a successful YouTube channel with almost 15,000 subscribers and over 1 million views.

Internationally acclaimed clarinet soloist and Churchill Fellow

Ashley William Smith is an internationally renowned and awardwinning clarinet soloist and bass clarinettist who performs and teaches art music, specialising in twentieth

and twenty-first century repertoire. After completing undergraduate studies at UWA, Ashley studied at the Australian National Academy of Music in Melbourne before completing a master's degree at Yale University and returning to UWA in 2014 to teach and share his passion for music with students at the Conservatorium of Music.

He is one of Australia's most indemand musicians, performing extensively throughout the United States, Europe and Asia.

Dr Louise Devenish

Powerhouse percussionist, leading researcher and passionate educator

Dr Louise Devenish is a Churchill Fellow and multi-award-winning performer, whose practice incorporates percussion performance, research and education. She brought her passion for percussion to the UWA Conservatorium of Music in 2013; the same year in which she established the Piñata Percussion ensemble, which now has a regular touring schedule and delivers more than 20 performances each year.

Louise's projects explore the history and future of contemporary percussion practice through performance and research. Two of her current projects explore Australian contemporary percussion history and new Australian music, with one including a national tour and album.

Dr Ionat Zurr

Pioneer and leader in the field of Biological Arts

Dr Ionat Zurr is an artist researcher in Fine Arts at the School of Design and SymbioticA at the School of Human Sciences.

Ionat's artist studio is the laboratory where she works with living cells as an artistic palette. Ionat critically explores the aesthetic, ethical and cultural implications of using life as a technology and its effects on bodies and ecologies. Her collaborative work includes a tiny jacket grown from mouse embryonic stem cells as an ironic sustainable solution and a tissue-engineered frog steak.

Ionat has been a visiting scholar at The Centre of Arts and Art History at Stanford University and Research Fellow at The Tissue Engineering & Organ Fabrication Laboratory, Harvard Medical School. Her work was exhibited at museums such as Pompidou Centre in Paris, MoMA NY, Mori Art Museum Japan, Art Gallery of Western Australia, Ars Electronica Austria, National Art Museum of China, and more.

"Our times, known as 'the biological turn', are characterised by human attempts, on a global scale, to engineer and commodify life, including our own. Now more than ever, it is vital for more artists to have access to the life sciences laboratories so they are able to learn, understand, critically engage and comment on the future of life and the living. Here in UWA we are fortunate to give this opportunity to the Fine Arts students."

Multidisciplinary artist engaged with contemporary social practice

Andy Quilty's professional experience intertwines personal art projects with wide-ranging experience working across tertiary institutions, community groups, Aboriginal art centres, nonprofit organisations and penal institutions across Australia.

Regularly exhibiting in solo and group shows in WA and interstate, Andy has worked in the UWA Fine Arts program since 2014. He also occupies the role of Program Patron for the Military Art Program Australia, a non-profit assisting Military Veterans through art therapy.

His work is held in public, corporate and private collections in Australia and internationally.

Bachelor of Arts

Explore what it means to be human. The Bachelor of Arts can include study of the humanities, social and cultural studies, languages, music and fine arts.

The Humanities deal with the histories, literatures and cultures of human civilisation, while the social sciences involve sociology, anthropology, political behaviours and other forms of human behaviour and organisation. With a choice of four European and four Asian language majors in this bachelor's degree (as well as the option to undertake individual units in Greek or Latin) you can learn a new language and study its related popular culture, art, film and literature. The UWA Conservatorium of Music provides opportunities for developing performance skills in instrumental or vocal studies, composition and the study of musicology and music education. You will be engaged in a broad range of learning styles, from traditional lectures to interactive tutorials and practical workshops involving digital media. Staff members are not only dedicated teachers but renowned scholars and researchers who are international leaders and experts in their fields.

Why study a Bachelor of Arts?

The Fine Arts major is an intensive studio-based course that prepares you for a successful career as a contemporary artist. By working closely with nationally and internationally recognised practicing artists and with experts from related creative arenas such as curatorial practice, art theory and the history of art, you will explore a range of artistic processes, techniques and technologies that will help you to establish your career in the field of contemporary art and culture.

The structure and program of offerings is highly distinctive and the only one of its kind in Australia. Following a foundational first year of study in which you develop fundamental practical skills in tandem with a body of conceptual and theoretical knowledge, you then select from three specialist pathways. These focused areas of creative practice are (a) Film; (b) Art and Biotechnologies; and (c) Art and Environment. Over the course of your second and third year of studio-based practice you incrementally develop expertise in one of these focus areas with complementary studies in the History of Art and elective studies in areas that align with your individual interests and support your creative work.

Within these cutting-edge focus areas we foster your artistic skills across established and emergent mediums. And, by giving you the opportunity to develop those skills within settings as varied as the science laboratory or in landscapes that are undergoing rapid environmental change, the Fine Arts major gives you the opportunity to artistically articulate and debate the most challenging and difficult issues facing our world.


Further study options





Direct pathways

If you already have a professional career in mind, our Direct Pathways combine your undergraduate and postgraduate degrees, providing you with a clearer direction to your career of choice.

- These pathways are also available through the Bachelor of Philosophy (Honours). Students taking this pathway require an ATAR of 98.00.

A Direct Pathway gives you an assured place in one of our postgraduate professional courses and, in some cases, reduces the length of your postgraduate course.

Some Direct Pathways require a higher ATAR than our

bachelor's degrees in Arts, Biomedical Science, Commerce and Science. To study one of our Direct Pathways, you'll need to meet the ATAR for the specific pathway and apply through TISC using its unique code. You will also need to continue to meet any ongoing requirements of the Direct Pathway for your course.


These involve a project of supervised but independent enquiry at an advanced level, resulting in the submissions of a thesis, exhibition or combination of thesis and creative work.

Develop your professional skills in curatorial studies.

This specialist degree provides a highstatus and professional qualification suitable for graduates who seek a museum profession in Australia or overseas as curators, exhibition organisers or researchers.

The degree is run in collaboration with UWA museums and various external Western Australian public galleries, providing students with direct experience in curatorial research and exhibition presentation.

Admission requirements

To be considered for admission to this course an applicant must:

- (a) hold a bachelor's degree of this University requiring at least four years of full-time study, or the part-time equivalent, in a subject area considered to be relevant to curatorial studies, or the equivalent of this qualification as recognised by the Board; and
- (b) be able to satisfy the Board that they have the general ability to complete the course and the special ability to prepare and present a thesis.

Career opportunities

This specialist degree provides a highstatus and professional qualification suitable for graduates wishing to enter the museum profession in Australia or overseas as curators, exhibition organisers or researchers.

Course structure

Students in this course prepare either a fully researched proposal for a major exhibition (at least 5000 words) and a fully publishable professional catalogue including an essay on all works proposed for exhibition (at least another 25,000 words); or a dissertation (at least 30,000 words) on an aspect of museology relevant to curatorial practice; or a detailed publishable catalogue raisonné (up to 30,000 words) of the works of an uncatalogued artist.

Students also complete a placement in a public gallery and prepare a detailed comparative report (up to 5000 words) in relation to this placement.

By agreement with their supervisors, students may commence at any time throughout the year, except December.

Pursue your passion with a supervised research and arts practice experience.

This specialist degree provides a high-quality academic qualification in the practice and theory of fine arts that carries credibility nationally and internationally and empowers artists in their pursuit of national and international recognition.

The Master of Fine Arts differs from other fine arts degrees in that it assumes a high level of both theoretical and practical expertise in fine arts. Students without this background are required to do preliminary work.

Admission requirements

To be considered for admission to this course an applicant must:

- (a) a relevant bachelor's degree, or an equivalent qualification as recognised by the Board; and
- (b) have completed the requirements for a qualification in Art Practice from a recognised tertiary institution, or be judged by the Board, having regard to the recommendation of the Head of the School of Design, to have equivalent practical expertise and professional standing; and
- (c) be able to satisfy the Board that they have the general ability to complete the course and the special ability to prepare and present a thesis.

Career opportunities

Graduates of this course will be equipped with advanced-level communication, research and analytical skills, allowing them to take the next step in their career pathway.

Course structure

The Master of Fine Arts consists of a combination of thesis and creative work. Students complete an exhibition of original artwork showing technical accomplishment and imaginative resource, and a thesis of not more than 25,000 words that critically engages with their exhibition in the context of arts/cultural theory, history or criticism.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The course is designed for published creative writers in any genre who seek to advance their academic and creative writing skills.

Requirements:

To be considered for admission to this course an applicant must:

- have a bachelor's degree with first class or upper second class honours in creative writing; or
- (ii) submit and have approved by the Head of the School of Humanities and the Board of the Graduate Research School a folio of creative writing, at least one-third of which has been published by recognised publishers, amounting to between 4000 and 5000 words of prose or the equivalent of poetry or drama as determined by the Head of School; and
- (b) submit and have approved by the Head of the School of Humanities and the Board of the Graduate Research School a 2000-to-3000-word critical essay on an aspect of the writer's craft.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Explore the artistic elements of science in this unique course that brings together the two distinct disciplines of art and science. The course is designed for experienced art practitioners, scientists or humanities scholars to explore creative bioresearch and focuses on recent advances in the life sciences, both in theory and practice. Emphasis is placed on critical thought, ethical and cultural issues and cross-disciplinary experimentation in art and science. You have access to scientific laboratories and take both art and science units that include a major project and dissertation.

Requirements:

To be considered for admission to this course an applicant must have:

- (a) a bachelor's degree in science, arts or fine arts; or
- (b) an equivalent qualification, as recognised by UWA; and
- (c) the equivalent of a UWA weighted average mark of at least 50 per cent

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course can be taken in either composition or performance and consists of a combination of thesis and creative work.

Work with world-class supervisors to prepare and present for examination either a portfolio of original compositions in a variety of genres, or two recitals showing professional skill and interpretative ability.

Requirements:

- (a) To be considered for admission to the course in composition an applicant must submit a folio of original compositions, the arrangements for which are determined by the Head of the Conservatorium of Music.
- (b) To be considered for admission to the course in performance an applicant must pass an audition, the arrangements for which, including the nature, duration and timing, are determined by the Head of the Conservatorium of Music.
- (c) All applicants must undergo an interview with the Head of the Conservatorium of Music or nominee.

(a) and (c) are approved additions to Doctor of Philosophy Rule 2.

The PhD is a program of independent, supervised research that is assessed solely on the basis of a thesis and is examined externally. Requirements

To be considered for admission to this course, an applicant must have demonstrated that they have fulfilled the requirements of the University Policy on 'Adequate Research Preparation' and any other requirements for admission of the University.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This specialist degree extends existing skills and experience in musical performance, composition or musicology, both as a professional-level degree and as a platform for doctoral-level study. All candidates produce independent research with the guidance of a supervisor.

Master of Music (composition)

Students are required to present for examination a portfolio consisting of a composition or group of compositions which show(s) advanced technical accomplishment and imaginative resource, and a thesis on a topic related to one or more aspects of the portfolio.

Master of Music (musicology)

Students are required to present for examination a thesis or a transcription and edition of a substantial body of music to be accompanied by a critical commentary.

Master of Music (performance)

Students are required to present for examination a recital program which demonstrates advanced artistic integrity and technical accomplishment, and a thesis on a topic related to one or more aspects of the recital.

Master of Music (orchestral performance)

Students are required to present for examination recordings of their performance projects, a report of their performance program by their WASO Orchestral Mentor, and a thesis on a topic related to one or more aspects of their performance program.

Requirements:

- (a) to be considered for admission to this course an applicant must have the degree of Bachelor of Music with honours or Bachelor of Arts with honours of this University, or equivalent as recognised by the Board.
- (b) an applicant for the course in composition must undergo a portfolio review and interview.
- (c) an applicant for the course in performance must pass an audition.
- (d) the arrangements for the portfolio review and interview or audition, including the nature, duration and timing, are determined by the Head of the Conservatorium of Music.

Results and change of preferences

Once you've received your final Year 12 results and ATAR, you'll have a short timeframe to change your preferences. This can be done online via the TISC website. Our Admissions team is available during this time to answer any questions you may have about changing preferences and entry requirements.





Apply

Once you've selected your UWA courses, submit your application at tisc.edu.au. Applications open early August and close late September. You can learn more about the TISC process at **tisc.edu.au**. For mid-year or mature-age applicants, you can apply directly to UWA via study.uwa.edu.au/apply.

Music

As well as meeting the ATAR, the following undergraduate majors offered by the UWA Conservatorium of Music have additional requirements:

Music Studies/Music General Studies

- Pass in WACE English or English Literature (or ESL if you are eligible).
- Pass an audition to be eligible for entry to a Music course. The required standard is AMEB Grade 5 practical or equivalent. For Music Studies a theory background comparable to WACE Music ATAR or equivalent (e.g. AMEB Grade 5 theory) is also required. Music General Studies does not require theory.
- Composition candidates will also need to submit a portfolio.

Music Specialist Studies

- Pass in WACE English or English Literature (or ESL if you are eligible).
- Pass an audition to be eligible for a Music course. The required standard for Music Specialist Studies is AMEB Grade 7 practical or equivalent. A theory background comparable to WACE Music ATAR or equivalent (e.g. AMEB Grade 5 theory) is also required.
- Composition candidates will also need to submit a portfolio.

How to apply for a postgraduate course

Applicants are expected to have completed an undergraduate degree at an approved university and undertaken adequate preparation for the degree for which they are applying.

Submit your application

Submit an application to the respective HDR support team in your faculty. This should include:



- A completed research application form available at study.uwa.edu.au/apply
- All certified documents as listed on the application form
- A research proposal

Successful applicants will be sent an offer package electronically, including a letter of offer/ authority to enrol, and acceptance documents. You should allow six to eight weeks to process.

Alternative entry pathways

We offer alternative entry pathways that allow you to be considered for admission to a course if you didn't meet our standard entry requirements.

AccessUWA

AccessUWA lets you enrol in units without being formally admitted to a degree course. Upon successful completion of a minimum number of units, you can apply for undergraduate admission based on your results. The units may also be credited towards your degree.

Broadway UWA

Students from designated schools receive an automatic positive ATAR adjustment, which may make you eligible for a place at UWA.

Fairway UWA

Fairway UWA is a program that offers support and activities throughout Year 12 for students who have faced challenging circumstances. Upon completion, you may be eligible for a place at UWA below the standard entry requirement.

Our First in Family program is designed to support students in achieving their goals to be the first in their immediate family to attend university. If you will be the first in your family to attend university, you may be eligible for a place at UWA below the standard entry requirement.

UWay

School-leaver applicants and applicants completing matureage WACE courses who believe their academic achievements in Year 12 have been adversely affected by certain disadvantages may apply for special consideration through the UWay scheme. Special consideration is also given to exceptional cases on an individual basis prior to each round of offers. Application forms are sent to WA secondary school principals in August and are also available online along with further information about the application process and closing dates.

Entry pathways for Indigenous undergraduate students

UWA's School of Indigenous Studies has extensive experience in offering tailored pathways into all undergraduate courses for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Pathways include the Aboriginal Orientation Course, UWA Smart Start Course and the Provisional Entry Scheme.

Enabling pathways

Indigenous students with an ATAR below 70.00, mature-age students and students who have not completed Year 12 studies or equivalent are encouraged to apply to one of the School's enabling (or bridging) courses. These are free courses that are also eligible for ABSTUDY and scholarships support.

Aboriginal Orientation Course

The Aboriginal Orientation Course is a one-year course which prepares students for entry into a UWA undergraduate degree in Arts, Biomedical Science, Commerce or Science. Students enrol in a minimum of four units each semester and the choice of units depends on the student's intended undergraduate degree.

UWA Smart Start Course

This course is offered at Albany and includes most units within the Aboriginal Orientation Course. It is open to Indigenous and non-Indigenous students and prepares students for first-year study in an undergraduate course.

How to apply

Applications for the Aboriginal Orientation Course and UWA Smart Start Course are available from September. All applicants will then be invited to attend an information session, as well as an interview and assessment at the Uni Entry Workshop in early December or late January. There is also a mid-year application round for these enabling courses.

Provisional Entry Scheme

Indigenous students who have an ATAR between 70.00 and 79.00 and matureage students with substantial work experience are eligible to apply for entry to an undergraduate degree through the School's Provisional Entry Scheme.

The Provisional Entry Scheme is competitive and applicants are ranked based on their education and/or employment background, interview and written assessment. Students are also required to have met the prerequisites for the course in which they are applying.

There is also a mid-year application round for this scheme.

There are two categories of applicants eligible under this scheme:

WACE applicants

Applicants must have completed WACE, achieved secondary graduation and obtained an ATAR of 70.00 or above to be considered for entry into a bachelor's degree in Arts, Biomedical Science, Commerce or Science.

Non-WACE applicants

This category includes applicants who have a good education background which may include TAFE, higher education studies or a bridging course and/or extensive relevant work experience.

How to apply

All applicants are required to complete an application form and supply supporting documentation to the School of Indigenous Studies and attend Uni Entry Workshop in December or late January. Uni Entry Workshops involve an information session, written assessment and interview.

Scholarships

Fine Arts scholarships

Scholarships dedicated to students studying Fine Arts include:

The WA Women's Society of Fine Arts and Crafts Scholarship in Design (\$5,000 per annum) to assist a high-achieving eligible female student to commence and pursue a Bachelor of Arts through the School of Design, and subsequently undertake a master's degree by coursework offered through the School of Design.

Robert Tindale Scholarship (\$2,500 per semester) to provide a scholarship for the purpose of encouraging and furthering study of Architecture, Landscape Architecture or Fine Arts at The University of Western Australia.

Music scholarships

Scholarships dedicated to students within the Conservatorium of Music include:

The Royal Over-Seas League Travel Award for supporting international understanding and friendship through social, music, arts and welfare activities. This scholarship includes a three week trip to London and Edinburgh to perform in the Royal Over-Seas League Arts Edinburgh Festival Fringe concert series

The Delano Music Scholarship (\$5,000) to assist and encourage gifted musical students to undertake instrumental performance units in any major offered by the Conservatorium of Music.

The Ann Brett Country Strings Scholarship (\$10,000) to encourage and assist a regional or remote music student who plays a string instrument to commence a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Philosophy (Honours) degree course and continue with a major in Specialist Music Studies.

The Wesley Uniting Church Music Scholarships (\$1,500-\$2,000) are awarded to 4 or 6 students each year to provide opportunities for students to pursue their musical development.

The Friends of UWA Music Alex Cohen Travelling **Scholarship** (\$10,000) to enable eligible students or graduates to undertake further study in musical performance outside Western Australia.

Prizes

In recognition of outstanding academic achievement, UWA awards prizes annually. These prizes are offered by the different areas of the University and are presented to recipients at an awards ceremony held by the relevant faculty.

Recipients are nominated by the relevant faculty based on results achieved in their previous academic year.

Please note, unless specified in the prize conditions, students do not need to apply for prizes.

Undergraduate fees

The Australian Government provides Commonwealth-supported places in courses at UWA for students who are Australian or New Zealand citizens or holders of an Australian permanent resident visa.

Commonwealth-supported students are required to make a contribution to the cost of their course. For Australian citizens, humanitarian visa holders and New Zealand Special Category Visa (NZ SCV) holders who meet the long-term residency requirements, the contribution can be deferred through the Australian taxation system via the Commonwealth Government's HECS-HELP loan scheme or paid directly to the University. Students who elect to use the HECS-HELP loan scheme do not need to pay any of their student contribution directly to UWA but may, if they choose, make partial payments each fee period.

For New Zealand citizens and other permanent residents of Australia, the contribution must be paid in full, directly to the University. Direct payments do not attract a discount. Further information on eligibility criteria for NZ SCV is available at studyassist.gov.au.

How much is the student contribution?

A course at UWA comprises a number of units. A standard unit is worth six (6) credit points. Full-time students usually study four six-credit-point units in a semester for a total of eight six-credit-point units in a year. Fees are billed on a semester basis.

The table below provides indicative costs for various discipline areas. The amount of your student contribution each semester depends on the mix of units in which you are enrolled.

The UWA Student Services and Amenities Fee

The UWA Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) is a compulsory fee that directly benefits all UWA students. The fee is used to develop and provide a range of recreational, sporting and educational facilities together with social, education and representation activities and services.

Postgraduate fees

Fees for postgraduate study are determined by the nature of the course in which you enrol. Different types of degrees are classified under different types of fee structures or loan schemes.

Coursework degrees

Postgraduate fee-paying places (PF-P)

A postgraduate degree is classified as coursework when the dissertation component, if any, is less than twothirds of the total course. Tuition fees are applicable to a large number of postgraduate coursework programs, and places in these courses are known as postgraduate fee-paying places. A deferred payment loan scheme called FEE-HELP is available under the Australian Government's Higher Education Loan Program. FEE-HELP assists eligible students who enrol in postgraduate fee-paying courses to pay part or all of their tuition fees. See the table opposite for eligibility criteria.

Commonwealth Supported Places (CSP)

Some postgraduate coursework degrees have Commonwealth Supported Places, meaning the tuition fees for the course are subsidised by the Australian Government so students are only required to pay 'student contribution' amounts for their units of study. Students offered a CSP in a postgraduate degree may be eligible for HECS-HELP. HECS-HELP is an Australian Government loan program to help eligible students in CSPs to defer payment of their student contributions. Comprehensive information regarding eligibility for postgraduate coursework loan programs can be found by visiting studyassist.gov.au.

Australian Government Research Training Program (RTP) for research degrees

A postgraduate degree is classified as a Higher Degree by Research (HDR) if the research component is at least twothirds of the course. At UWA, Australian citizens and permanent residents, and New Zealand citizens, are exempt from paying tuition fees for HDRs under the Research Training Program (RTP). The RTP is a dedicated pool of funding provided by the Australian Government to support students undertaking research doctorate and master's by research degrees. Domestic RTP Fees Offset Scholarships provide exemption from payment of tuition fees for up to four years' full-time equivalent study for a doctorate by research and two years' full-time equivalent study for a master's by research degree. Assessment of eligibility for an RTP Domestic Fees Offset Scholarship and allocation occurs automatically in conjunction with an application for admission.

Combined coursework and research degrees

Candidates in some combined courses may be required to pay fees or organise a loan for the coursework component of their combined degree, even though the research component is covered by the RTP for eligible students. If in doubt about your eligibility under the scheme, contact the Graduate Research School at pghelp@postgraduate.uwa.edu.au or visit postgraduate.uwa.edu.au.

Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF)

The compulsory Student Services and Amenities Fee is payable by all students enrolled at UWA. Income from this fee funds the development and provision of educational, recreational, social and sporting facilities and activities for the direct benefit of all UWA students. Research degree candidates who have been approved to undertake their research overseas may apply to have their fee waived. Applications are made directly to the Graduate Research School. Living allowances

Some courses have been approved by the Department of Social Services for Student Support Payments. Eligible students can receive one of Youth Allowance, Austudy or the Pensioner Education Supplement. 
