### *Critical Information Summary*

Title and brief description	ENGLM503 Programming and Planning for Subject English. The unit explores the different methods through which English teachers can strategically plan and program classroom teaching and learning. The unit supports participants to develop working programs for individual classroom situations and supports teachers in their professional practice. The unit will be mapped against AITSL standards and is supported by a joint research project conducted by UWA English and Literary Studies and the WA English Teachers' Association.
